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Highlights from the 17th World Conference on Transport Research, Toulouse 2026

The global transport research community came together in Toulouse this July for the **17th World Conference on Transport Research, hosted by the Toulouse School of Economics (TSE) and Toulouse Capitole University**. Held every three years, the conference marked a special milestone in 2026: 50 years of WCTR, and a return to a European campus after several editions held elsewhere.

More than 1,500 participants gathered over four days to exchange ideas, present research and discuss the challenges shaping the future of transport. Researchers, policymakers, industry representatives and academics came together across a wide range of topics, from logistics and engineering to digital technologies and operational research. As the European capital of aeronautics and aerospace and a major mobility hub, Toulouse benefits from

an ecosystem linking academic research, industry and public institutions, a regional context that helped the event bring together leading transport organisations such as Airbus, SNCF and Air France.

The week's programme combined presentations, debates and technical tours.

Setting the theme: deglobalisation and fragmentation

The conference opened on 6 July with an International Session on "Transport and Supply Chain Policy Responses to the Deglobalising and Fragmenting World," attended by Professor Tae Hoon Oum, President of the World Conference on Transport Research Society (WCTRS). Three presentations developed the theme: "Building Resilient Transport Systems," "Deglobalisation, Tariffs, and Chokepoints," and "Aviation at a Crossroads: Freedoms of the Air and the Future of Global Connectivity."

Opening ceremony

The conference was formally launched on 7 July, with addresses from WCTRS President Tae Hoon Oum; the Mayor of Toulouse, Jean-Luc Moudenc; the Vice-President of the Occitanie Region, Nadia Pellefigue; the Deputy Mayor of Toulouse responsible for transport, Maxime Boyer; the President of Toulouse Capitole University, Hugues Kenfack; the Director-General of the Jean-Jacques Laffont Foundation, Karine Van Der Straeten; the Director of the Toulouse School of Economics, Victoria Barham; the Chair of the WCTRS Scientific Committee, Lóri Tavasszy; the WCTR 2026 Conference Director, Marc Ivaldi; and WCTRS Co-Secretary General Giovanni Circella.

General Plenary Session

The General Plenary, also held on 7 July, featured two keynote addresses. Jean Tirole, Honorary President of TSE and 2014 Nobel laureate, spoke on "Global Disorder, Industrial Policy, and the Transport Sector." Moshe Ben-Akiva, Professor at MIT, spoke on "Transportation Demand: From Prediction to Personalisation with Actionable Heterogeneity."

Industrial Insights

The Industrial Insights round-table discussions, sponsored by WCTR 2026 partners and held during the lunch breaks, covered "Global Air Transport: Can Sustainability and Fair Competition Be Aligned?", "How can urban mobility innovation drive the decarbonisation of our cities?", "Rebalancing Urban Space: Reducing Car Use in Favor of Public Transport and Cycling", "Technological, Industrial and Economic Challenges of Dynamic Charging for Future Mobility", "Can we save the climate without data and the economy?", and "Pioneering Sustainable Mobility: The Strategic Edge of Southern France." The sessions were held in the presence of WCTR 2026 partners Air France-KLM, EIT Urban Mobility, VINCI, Egis, Transdev and the Occitanie Region.

Celebrating 50 years and imagining the next 50

A major highlight of the week was the 50th Anniversary Session on 9 July, which looked back at the major advances in transport research over the past five decades and outlined the challenges ahead. The session also honoured the winners of the "Manifesto for the Future of Transport Research" competition, which invited young researchers to imagine the next fifty years of transport research through a manifesto and a video.

WCTR 2026 Scientific Activity Overview: Interaction with WCTRS Scientific Committee Chair- Lori Tavasszy

Professor Lori Tavasszy is the Chair of the WCTRS Scientific Committee (SCC). Here is his response to some questions about the recently concluded WCTR 2026 in Toulouse, France.

1. Which topics emerged during the conference?

I can mention three categories of findings: new hot topics, new frontiers in classical topics, and interesting methodological developments.

- Starting with the **hot topics**, we see that decarbonization is still a dominant theme for many studies which, unfortunately, in today's world is not trivial. As expected, resilience against disruptions is receiving increasing attention, be it from the new geopolitical landscape, Covid-19 or the effect of new technologies. In this latter category, AI is being debated well. Together with suitable computing architectures (e.g. edge, GPUs), AI allows an unmatched speed of model evaluations and allows us to connect to a vast infrastructure of sensors. This brings digital twins radically closer. At the same time, the data hunger of AI applications creates processing and energy challenges.
- Turning to the **new frontiers in classical topics**, in several niches new results have come forward that provide nuance. Let me give a couple of examples. First, High-Speed Rail has shown plateauing demand in some regions, which may dampen large-scale extension ambitions. Second, in air transport, it appears that low-cost carriers are not driving out incumbents but do create lower general price levels. Third, in maritime technology, as in road transport, circularity of vehicles/vessels and components, in particular for electrification, is developing quickly. Fourth, there has been much discussion on the influence of politics and related governance arrangements on transport planning and appraisal. Fifth, the attention is shifting from passively assessing distributive effects to actively seeking fair arrangements: a change in the ethics of policymaking. And sixth, sustainable finance is emerging as an important part of the discussion on funding of infrastructure.

- On the **methodological developments**, I was happy to see renewed attention and active calls for a stronger position of qualitative & mixed-methods research – not just as the first step towards quantitative modelling, but as empirical work that has its own place to understand the world and to design improvements. We also see increased applications of advanced causal inference methods, and of course an important role for explainable AI.

2. What is next for the Scientific Committee?

We are preparing the WCTR issue of Elsevier's Transport Research Procedia, and 26 special issues in different scientific journals. Almost 600 authors will receive a letter from us about publishing their paper in Procedia, and well over 400 will be invited to submit their work to a journal. The reviews will be conducted after the Summer break.

3. Do you have any general thoughts on the conference?

Overall, it has been a great meeting of minds where we have worked in unison and with passion to curate the contents. The atmosphere was amazing, as always at WCTR. I congratulate the Toulouse team on the 2026 edition of our conference and thank them for their fantastic hospitality! Then, we will turn to look forward, working with the Brisbane team towards the 2029 WCTR!

Jules Dupuit Prize 2026 Awarded to Yoshisugu Hayashi

Announcement by Alain Bonnafous (Chairman of Dupuit Prize Sub Committee) at Awarding Ceremony, Toulouse

I would first like to remind you that our colleagues Marc Gaudry (from the University of Montreal) and Antti Talvitie (from the University of Helsinki) initiated the Jules Dupuit Prize at the 1992 Conference in Lyon and persuaded the Finnish Ramboll Group to sponsor it every three years. Today, the prize is sponsored by the WCTRS.

I would like to extend my warmest thanks to Krishna Rao, Professor at the Indian Institute of Technology Bombay, and to Hideki Nakamura, Professor at Nagoya University, for their contribution, which led our Sub-Committee to a unanimous decision despite the very high level of the competitors.

As confirmed by the Steering Committee, **the 2026 Jules Dupuit Prize is awarded to Yoshitsugu Hayashi.**

Dear Yoshi, I will be very brief in reminding your position regarding the three requirements of this prize.

First requirement: **“A record of outstanding scientific work; a significant reputation in transport policy”**. Every researcher knows your contributions once they have addressed the topics of Transport and Land Use, of Value Capture (I am thinking of your seminal paper from 1988), of Sustainable Transport or of Quality of Life.

Second requirement: **“A reputation for truly international activity including involvement in global networks”**. Besides your involvement in relations with The World Bank or the ITF, it should be emphasized that you are an Executive Committee Member of the Club of Rome Board (the only one among WCTRS members).

Third requirement: **“Particular contributions to and reputation within WCTRS”**.

Because you are, Yoshi, the only member of WCTRS taking all the scientific and managerial duties of the Society, it would take too long to list them all. I will simply highlight a lesser-known role: at the first World Conference in Rotterdam in 1977, half a century ago, you were a student attendee.

Congratulations, Yoshi, on this magnificent and long journey, and above all, thank you.

Message from the Laureate of Jules Dupuit Prize Winner- Yoshisugu Hayashi

My research life began in the mid-1970s, in the laboratory of my mentor, Professor Hideo Nakamura, at the University of Tokyo, where I built a land use–transport model, CALUTAS, to assess the effects of a planned road-rail bridge crossing Tokyo Bay on mitigating Tokyo's growing population by relocating it to Boso Peninsula on the opposite shore. I joined ISGLUTI (the International Study Group on Land Use – Transport Interaction) as its youngest member, marking my entry into international collaborative research.

My work has focused, first, on modeling the effects of transport infrastructure on land-use change, urban sprawl, and land value increase, as well as on local and global environmental impacts; and second, on the countermeasure policies these effects call for, such as environmental taxation, value capture, and smart-shrink methodologies for compact cities. This work ultimately led me to the QOL Accessibility Model, which reframes the evaluation of transport infrastructure and urban compaction — shifting from an efficiency-based assessment grounded in national and regional GDP growth to a sufficiency-based assessment grounded in individual Quality of Life, one capable of measuring progress toward the SDGs' principle of "leaving no one behind".

Besides this academic work, I went on to assess the effects of real-world megaprojects — including the Bay Bridge and the Tsukuba Express in Tokyo, the inauguration of an urban rail network to relieve Bangkok's notoriously severe traffic congestion, and India's High Speed Rail linking Mumbai and Ahmedabad, 500 km apart, among others.

Reaching beyond transport research, I have continued to advocate the importance of mitigating emissions from transport at side events of the UNFCCC COP, and, since 2015, as a Full Member and Board Member of the Club of Rome — known for its report "The Limits to Growth" (1972) — through which I pursue human well-being and global sustainability.

WCTRS has been my life. From my first participation as a Ph.D. student at the inaugural Rotterdam conference (1977), through hosting the 5th conference in Yokohama (1989), while being deeply involved in the operational management of the WCTR Society, to the 17th conference in Toulouse (2026) — across the full 49 years of this journey, from the founding era of the society to its evolution into today's foremost academic forum in the field — WCTRS has continually shown me a dazzling, dreamlike world.

It is with great honor that I now receive the Jules Dupuit Prize, WCTRS's highest award, and I offer my deepest gratitude to the wonderful colleagues who have walked this path together with WCTRS, and also to the Dupuit Prize Subcommittee.

WCTRS Subway Efficiency Task Force Held Successful Special Session at WCTR 2026



The **WCTRS Subway Efficiency Task Force** held its special session, “**The 2nd Triennial Report and Panel Discussion**,” on **9 July 2026** during the **WCTR 2026 Conference in Toulouse, France**. Chaired by **Prof. Kun Wang** of **The Hong Kong Polytechnic University**, the session brought together researchers, industry experts, and subway practitioners to present the latest findings from the Task Force’s global subway benchmarking project, recognize top-performing subway systems, and discuss future directions for research and practice.

The session opened with remarks by **Prof. Tae Hoon Oum**, President of the WCTR Society and Founding Chair of the Subway Efficiency Task Force. Reflecting on the Task Force’s establishment in 2021, Prof. Oum emphasized the importance of developing internationally comparable measures of subway system efficiency while accounting for differences in network characteristics, urban context, and operating environments.

Prof. Kun Wang then reviewed the evolution of the benchmarking initiative. Building on the inaugural report presented at WCTR 2023 in Montreal, the second triennial report substantially expanded both the geographical coverage and the underlying database, providing updated benchmarking results for the 2021–2024 period.

Dr. Shuli Liu of Beijing Jiaotong University (BJTU) presented the main report, summarizing the data collection and benchmarking results. Drawing on data from **101 subway systems across five continents**, the report represents one of the Task Force's most comprehensive global subway benchmarking exercises. The analysis revealed substantial regional variation in operational efficiency while identifying subway systems that consistently achieved outstanding performance throughout the 2021–2024 period. The Task Force also acknowledged the significant contribution of the **BJTU research team**, led by **Prof. Hongchang Li**, which conducted the efficiency analysis underpinning this round of benchmarking.

Based on the benchmarking results, the Task Force announced the Outstanding Subway Operating Cities for the 2021–2024 period:

- Asia: Hong Kong
- Australia/Oceania: Sydney
- Europe: Copenhagen
- North America: Toronto
- South America: Santiago

A highlight of the session was the **acceptance remarks** by **Mr. Carlos Melo**, Planning and Customer Officer of **Metro de Santiago**, who shared practical insights into Santiago's operational experience and reflected on how benchmarking can support continuous improvement in subway management and service delivery.

The session concluded with an engaging panel discussion featuring **Prof. Tae Oum, Prof. Pierluigi Coppola, Prof. Giovanni Cirella, Prof. Gopal R. Patil, Prof. Yiping Le, Prof. Xiao Luo and Dr. Kyungtaek Kim**. Drawing on perspectives from academia and industry, panelists explored both methodological and policy issues arising from the benchmarking results. Topics included the challenges of international data collection and comparability, the role of benchmarking in supporting evidence-based management, and opportunities for strengthening collaboration between researchers and subway operators.

Beyond methodological discussions, panelists also examined several regional issues in greater depth. They considered why some smaller European subway systems, such as Copenhagen and Oslo, consistently achieve high efficiency; how rapidly expanding systems in China and India can balance operational efficiency with network expansion and service accessibility; and what factors may explain performance differences among subway systems in Japan, South Korea, and mainland China. Participants agreed that global benchmarking should serve not only to recognize high-performing systems, but also to facilitate knowledge exchange, encourage continuous improvement, and support more informed urban transport policy.

Overall, the successful session highlighted the growing role of the WCTRS Subway Efficiency Task Force as a global platform for collaborative research on subway performance. The session attracted strong interest from conference participants and sparked lively discussion on the future of international subway benchmarking. Looking ahead, the Task Force will continue to expand its global database, deepen collaboration with subway operators worldwide, and further refine its analytical framework to support more efficient, resilient, and sustainable urban rail systems worldwide.

Special Note: The WCTRS Subway Efficiency Task Force welcomes researchers and subway professionals who are committed to contributing to the development of a global subway benchmarking database. We particularly encourage experts who can support international data collection and comparative analysis to join our collaborative network. Through expanding global participation, the Task Force aims to strengthen the quality, coverage, and long-term sustainability of international subway benchmarking research.

4. WCTRS-Y Welcome Session

The WCTRS-Y 2026 programme officially commenced on 6 July 2026 in Toulouse, France, with a Welcome Session bringing together young transport researchers, senior scholars, and members of the wider WCTRS community. The session set the tone for the conference by highlighting scientific excellence, international collaboration, and the importance of creating meaningful opportunities for the next generation of transport researchers.

The session was opened by Dr Ann Mary Varghese, WCTRS-Y Conference Chair, who welcomed participants and introduced WCTRS-Y and the programme of activities planned for the conference. The opening provided an overview of the technical sessions and wider initiatives designed to encourage research exchange, professional development, networking, and stronger engagement of young researchers within WCTRS.

Prof. Rosário Macário, WCTRS-Y Mentor, delivered the Welcome Address, reflecting on the vision of WCTRS-Y and its role in empowering emerging transport researchers. She emphasised the importance of building an inclusive and supportive international community in which young scholars can develop their research, networks, and academic careers.

In his Presidential Address, Prof. Tae Hoon Oum highlighted the important role of young researchers in shaping the future of transport research and the continued development of WCTRS. His remarks encouraged participants to actively contribute their ideas and perspectives to the Society and the broader transport research community.

The Welcome Session provided an inspiring opening to WCTRS-Y 2026, reinforcing its central objective: to create a platform where young transport researchers can present their work, develop professionally, build international networks, and become active contributors to the future of WCTRS and transport research globally.

5. WCTRS-Y Sessions

A total of **44 final papers** were included in the programme, with **9 dedicated research sessions** that provided young researchers with a platform to present their latest work, receive feedback, and engage in discussions with peers and senior scholars.

At the full-paper stage, each paper was reviewed by one senior SIG-level head or professor-level senior researcher, in addition to reviews from two young scholars.

6. From Young Researchers' Ideas to the WCTRS 50th Anniversary

One of the highlights of WCTRS-Y 2026 was the opportunity for young researchers to contribute to the celebrations of the 50th anniversary of the World Conference on Transport Research Society (WCTRS).

The winning manifestos were presented and recognised during the **WCTRS 50th Anniversary Session**, giving the ideas and perspectives of the next generation of transport researchers visibility within the wider international research community.

We hope that the conversations started during WCTRS-Y 2026 will continue to grow into new collaborations, research partnerships, and opportunities across the global transport research community. The energy, curiosity, and enthusiasm of young researchers made this year's programme truly special.

WCTR 2026 Manifesto: Predicting the Unpredictable: Uncertainty as a State of the Art in Transport Research

What will transport systems look like in 2076? More importantly, how should transport research can respond to potential challenges and identifies opportunities over the long term?

These are the central questions explored in the WCTR 2026 Manifesto, **Predicting the Unpredictable: Uncertainty as a State of the Art in Transport Research**, prepared by Denise Beil, Lander Jacobs, Mylena Cristine Rodrigues de Jesus, and Yubing Lei for the **WCTRS 50th Anniversary Manifesto Competition**. Rather than attempting to forecast a single future, the manifesto treats uncertainty itself as a starting point and makes it a core principle of transport research.

The manifesto presents three plausible long-term scenarios for the world of 2076:

- **The Fragmented World**, where climate crises, geopolitical tensions, and economic instability lead to increasingly fragile transport systems.
- **The Drifting World**, where today's trends continue with gradual improvements but without major systemic disruptions or transformative breakthroughs.
- **The Cooperative World**, where international collaboration, technological innovation, and sustainable governance create resilient, integrated, and equitable transport systems.

Rather than predicting which future will emerge, these scenarios encourage researchers to consider how current research choices may influence future transport systems and research agendas. Which future unfolds, the authors argue, depends on the direction each of six key drivers takes, and on how they interact: climate, geopolitics, infrastructure, economy, technology, and social context.

A central message of the manifesto is that transport research should no longer be designed around assumptions of stability. Instead, researchers must embrace uncertainty by developing methods and evidence that remain analytically useful regardless of which future arrives. This shift requires moving beyond traditional approaches focused solely on efficiency and demand forecasting toward research that prioritises resilience, adaptability, and equity. This does not imply a loss of analytical rigour. It means being explicit about assumptions, testing findings across divergent conditions, and building models that reveal their own limits.

To support this vision, the manifesto proposes three guiding principles:

- Design research for uncertainty rather than a single expected future.
-

- Prepare for collapse while building for cooperation, rather than concentrating research on the middle trajectory.
- Give equity deliberate research attention in every future, rather than treating it as a best-case luxury.

The authors further identify five research directions for the uncertain future:

- Building infrastructure for unpredictable futures.
- Transforming logistics and supply networks beyond efficiency.
- Measuring and protecting mobility as a right.
- Governing transport systems and shaping behaviour.
- Governing AI and digital infrastructure for public benefit.

As WCTRS celebrates fifty years of advancing transport research, this manifesto serves as both a reflection and a call to action. It reminds us that transport systems are not simply technical networks to be optimised, but social, political, and environmental ones, shaped by decisions about who has access, who bears the cost, and who is left behind.

The future of transport cannot be predicted. But it can be shaped: by the questions researchers choose to ask, the communities they include, the governance they help build, and the priorities they set today.

SIG B5 – Freight Transport Modelling: An Unconference at WCTR 2026



SIG B5 (Freight Transport Modelling) hosted an "unconference" session, where participants were invited to discuss freight modelling in a future context of digital twins and AI. Will freight modelling as we know it be obsolete? Or perhaps even more important than ever?

A group of new and old freight modellers met in the early morning session (which was moved outside for a more inspiring environment and slightly lower temperature). Many different perspectives on AI and Freight modeling were brought into the dialogue, which started conversations also beyond the session. We look forward to continue these conversations online until we meet again at the next WCTR conference!

SIGF4 : International Case Studies on Quality of Life (QOL) IMPACTS OF SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT AT WCTR 2026

The WCTR 2026 Special Session "**International Case Studies on Quality of Life Impacts of Sustainable Transport**" was organised by WCTRS SIG-F4 in collaboration with the International Group on Sustainable Transport and Livability (IGSTL), and held on 9 July 2026 in Toulouse, France.

Chaired by Prof. Ashish Verma (Indian Institute of Science, Bengaluru), with Ms. Ann Das as rapporteur, the session presented evidence from India, Vienna, London, Montréal and Bangkok on how transport policy, accessibility, equity and street design influence quality of life.



Guest Speaker: Prof. Guenter Emberger, TU Vienna

Vienna's Path to Livability: Sustainable Transport Policy as a Driver of Quality of Life

Prof. Guenter Emberger of TU Vienna described how Vienna raised the share of public transport, walking and cycling to 74% through decades of affordable public transport, traffic calming, active-mobility investment and comprehensive parking management. His central point was that sustainable alternatives must be reinforced over time and must reclaim public space. The main obstacles, he argued, are political and institutional rather than technical, and climate adaptation and disaster resilience are becoming increasingly urgent additions to the agenda.

“Long-term policy consistency, not isolated individual measures, produces true urban transformation.”



Guest Speaker: Dr. Abhilash Chandra Singh, Trinity College Dublin, Ireland

Can accessibility measures be used to capture qualitative impacts of transport?

Dr. Abhilash C. Singh presented a London study on access to education, examining what changes when accessibility includes the quality of both the journey and the destination. He emphasised that conventional measures overestimated accessibility by around 8% on average when air pollution and crime were omitted. The wider message was that an opportunity cannot be considered fully accessible if reaching it exposes people to unsafe, unhealthy or stressful conditions, or if the destination itself is unsuitable or of poor quality.

“Regional accessibility planning needs to take qualitative factors into account, not just travel time”



Guest Speaker: Prof. Martin Trépanier, Montreal Polytechnic

Gender Differences in Public Transport Trip Components

Prof. Martin Trépanier examined public-transport in-vehicle speeds through the intersecting effects of gender, income, trip purpose and household type. Men’s journeys were approximately 1 km/h faster on average, with the gender difference more pronounced among lower-income travellers. Shopping trips were slower than return-home and work trips, while household structure created further variations. Women experienced slower journeys in most household groups, although the pattern reversed among single-parent households.

Guest Speaker: Prof. Kazuki Nakamura, Meijo University

Prof. Kazuki Nakamura of Meijo University used virtual Bangkok street scenarios to test how setbacks, street widening, vendors and smart small vehicles affect walking. The study connected willingness to walk with safety, comfort, physical and mental health, and life satisfaction. It also showed that vendors can enrich street life only when adequate pedestrian space is protected.

“Walkability improvement can contribute to quality-of-life enhancement through positive perceptions of streets.”



Guest Speaker: Prof. Ashish Verma, Indian Institute of Science, Bengaluru

Understanding Quality of Life (QoL) impacts of Sustainable Transport: Case Studies from India

Prof. Ashish Verma concluded with Indian case studies on the Transportation Quality of Life Index, integrating mobility, environmental, health and accessibility dimensions and evaluating alternative sustainable-transport scenarios. Presented alongside evidence linking rising GDP per capita with rapid motorisation in many countries, he asked whether India can achieve economic growth and improved living standards without following the same car-dependent pathway. He also discussed transport's direct and indirect contribution to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), including health, safety, accessibility, environmental quality and sustainable urban development.

“Can India saturate car ownership at a much lower level and decouple vehicle ownership and use from the standard of living?”

Key Outcomes

- Quality of life should become a core measure of transport performance, assessed through health, safety, accessibility, environmental quality, equity and well-being.
- Sustainable mobility requires coordinated and sustained policy, as Vienna's combination of investment, parking management and long-term political and institutional commitment showed.
- Accessibility and equity must be examined beyond conventional averages, since London found accessibility overstated by around 8% when journey conditions were ignored, and Montréal found unequal journey speeds within a single network.
- Street design can influence health, mode choice and happiness, with the Bangkok experiment linking walkability to safety, comfort and adequate for both pedestrian movement and community activity.
- Economic growth need not result in equivalent growth in car dependence, with the Indian case studies demonstrating how sustainable transport scenarios can be evaluated through a measurable quality of life framework.

Closing discussion

Across the five perspectives, the session established that sustainable transport is not simply about moving people more efficiently, but about improving how people experience mobility and urban life. A closing discussion on applying Vienna's lessons to Jakarta and other rapidly growing cities underlined that successful policies cannot be copied mechanically: they must be adapted to local institutional, economic and urban conditions.

Collectively, the session called for transport planning that is people-centred, evidence-based, and measured by its contribution to healthier, safer, fairer and more liveable communities.

European Aviation Conference 2026: Lift or Drag? Taxes, Subsidies, and Sustainable Aviation



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Shaping Global Transport Leaders: The C-MAT MSc. Maritime or Air Transport Management at University of Antwerp and Antwerp Management School
